Hester Thrale (1741-1821)

Bluestocking wit, diarist, biographer, lively, outspoken, clever, a little wild, petite 30-something

Henry Thrale (1721–1781)

Brewer, Hester's 1st husband, tall, good-looking, reserved, 50ish

Samuel Johnson (1709–1784)

Brilliant literary critic, biographer, essayist, pompous, slovenly dressed with grey wig askew, corpulent, frequent convulsive motions, late 60s

James Boswell (1745-1790)

Scottish lawyer, biographer of Samuel Johnson, rival to Hester, arrogant, panders to Johnson, notes poking out of his pockets, early 40s

Frances Burney (1752-1840)

Bluestocking novelist, friend to Hester, diarist, playwright, shy, attractive, mid-20s

"Queeney" Thrale (1764-1857)

The Thrales' firstborn child, a prodigy, haughty, in her late teens

Gabriel Piozzi (1740-1809)

Thrale children's Italian music teacher, tenor, composer, handsome, kind, early 40s

Abigail

Servant to Thrale family

MICHAEL HACKETT is a Professor of Directing and Theater History in the Department of Theater at the UCLA School of Theater, Film and Television. He is a co-editor and wrote the introduction for *Five Comedies by Carlo Goldoni* for the University of Toronto Press.
